
A Message from Principal Martino



Congratulations! You made it through the first month of Kindergarten! This month is a turning point as we teachers have been taking a closer look at your young scholars. Homework begins this month. Please check your child's yellow Take-Home Folder nightly for their task for each weeknight evening (a notebook has been provided for any written responses. There is also a timed letter practice (How many letters can your kinder name in 1 minute). This will change each month as preparation for their Letter Licenses and our DIBELS assessments throughout the year. You will also find a "Reading Log" that your child can color in each night you read together. Completed monthly calendars of homework will be recognized by your child's teacher.

Reminders:

Supporting Your Student at Home:

Our students are learning about how to build their reading stamina. To encourage this at home, challenge your student to read independently for as long as they can!! Also, when seeing numbers, ask your child to add them together. We have been working hard on addition. Start going over our snap words with your child.

We have been learning more and more snap words each day!

What We Are Learning This Month:

Reading: As readers, we are learning how to build good habits while reading and how to be a good reading partner!

Math: As mathematicians, we are solving addition and subtraction problems up to 10!

Writing: As writers, we will be creating our very own small moment stories! **Social Studies/Science:** In Science, we will be having in depth conversations and hands-on experiments about the sky!



HELLO FAMILIES AND WELCOME TO SECOND GRADE!

We have been loving getting to know our sweet new second grade students! We have spent the first few weeks of school going over routines and expectations as we move back into school mode and the kids have been doing an amazing job—we are **SO PROUD**!

MATH: We have just started Topic 1—Fluently Add and Subtract within 20. Our next unit will be Topic 2—Work with Equal Groups. Please make sure your child is completing their nightly homework. Homework packets are sent home at the beginning of each unit. You may help your child at home by practicing their addition and subtraction skills from 0-20. Also, **CLICK HERE** to

access **FREE** addition printable games to use at home!

READING: We have started our Reader's Workshop by going over routines and expectations in order to prepare for our first unit—Becoming a Big Kid Reader. This unit will help our students learn fundamental skills needed to be a lifelong reader and learner. We also began our fall reading assessments to see what level our students are as readers. WRITING: We have started our first unit—Lessons from the Masters: Improving Narrative Writing. In this unit, students are choosing small moments in their life and using the Narrative Writing Rubric to improve and enhance their writing. Students are working hard to develop their writing stamina!

PHONICS: We have just started our first Phonics unit—Growing into Second-Grade Phonics. We were so impressed to hear all of the amazing phonics skills students remembered learning about from their fantastic first grade teachers and how that has helped them so far in Phonics for second grade. 



Media, Music, Physical Education, and Art



Welcome back to the 2022-2023 school year! Ms. Labelle and Ms. Templeton will be your media specialists this year and we are very excited to work with your child!

In Pre-K and Kindergarten, we will be getting to know our library. We will be learning about fiction and non-fiction books and how we can tell the difference between them. We will also be learning about how the sections are arranged.

In First grade we will be learning about the different parts of a book (author, illustrator, title, front cover, spine, spine label and the barcode) and how they help us. We will also be learning about the characteristics of fiction stories.

In Second grade we will be learning how to use Destiny to find our books in the library. We will also be practicing locating a book in the Everybody section using alphabetical order.

News from Mrs. Price's Art Classroom:

The school year is off to a great start! The children have been so excited to come to art class and I have enjoyed getting to know them. Please continue to send in your donations of good "junk". We can always use home and garden type magazines, leftover scrap paper, buttons, etc. Thank you all for your support!

This month **Pre-Kindergarten** students will continue to work on developing their fine motor skills by making marks and experiencing various fun art materials. We will explore printmaking by using daubers to create colorful foliage for a fall tree.

In October, **Kindergarten** students will continue to learn about how artists use the art elements of line, shape, and color. We will finish up our mixed-media collages inspired by the artist Piet Mondrian. Then we will learn how to draw pumpkins and mix yellow and red to paint them orange.

First Grade students and **Second Grade** students are going to learn about the artist Yayoi Kusama and her use of the art elements: line, shape, and color. They will make a fall themed artwork that is inspired by her unique style.

Third Grade students will draw landscapes and learn a variety of strategies to make a flat piece of paper look like it has depth.

This month, **Fourth Grade** students will learn about perspective and use a variety of strategies to make a flat piece of paper look like it has depth.

Fifth Graders will learn about the art element Value. They will use shading to make flat shapes look 3-D. Next, students will use what they learned about Value in the creation of Tim Burton inspired self-portraits.


Math Tips with Mrs. J

Developing a Math Mindset

Every child at some point will probably face a math challenge, so helping our students to develop a growth mindset can help them to persevere and overcome these challenges! Here are some examples that will help your child to develop a positive mindset.




The Literacy Corner with Mrs. Morris and Mr. Pfeifer

RWES Health Suite

welcome to the 2022-2023 school year. We want our student happy and health to grow and learn, and to exceed in all new challenges. The collaborations between Health Suite (HS) with parents, students, staff, and faculty is an essential component to ensure optimal guidance for our students, because healthy students are better learners.

<u>Immunization</u> status must be current. Grace period of 20 days will expire as of 9/27/22 (K-5th) AND 9/29/22 (PK). Students will not be allowed to attend school on this date if they are not current on vaccines.

Physical exam/Dental exam/Lead exam- All students must have a record of these exams on file.

<u>Medications</u>- All medications that are required during the school day must be administered by the school nurse. Medications, along with written doctor's order, should be provided to school nurse by parent or parent representative. Medications must be in original bottle with label and not expired.

<u>Yellow Discretionary Medication Form</u> - Please complete this form, sign and return to provide parental permission for students to receive over the counter (OTC) medications such as Acetaminophen and cough drops (self-carry K-5th).

<u>Asthma or Severe Allergy</u>- Students with severe allergies or asthma that require the use of EpiPen or inhalers should have these medications available for them at school in the Health Suite. Each mediation requires doctors order.

<u>Fevers-</u> Any student with a fever 100 degrees or greater will be excluded per HCPS policy. Student must be fever 24 hours without medication. Any student sent home should reframe from returning the following day.

You are welcome to send in special pencils or stickers that can be handed out on your child's birthday. Please contact your child's teacher to let him/her know.

We also respectfully request that birthday/party invitations not be sent to school for either the child or teacher to distribute to other students. This disrupts the educational environment of our school, and we would appreciate your cooperation with this important policy.

****BUS LOOP REMINDER****

Cars are not allowed in the bus loop from 8:00-9:00 a.m. and 3:00-4:00 p.m. daily. Please adhere to the posted signs and guidelines and use the upper parking lot during these times. Also, please do not park on the RED CURB in front of the school as this is for emergency vehicles only.

Student Pick-Up and/or Changes in Dismissal

Parents are asked to write a note to your child's teacher if your child's dismissal procedure is going to change on any day. Teachers are instructed to send all students home using their normally dismissal mode, unless there is a note identifying an alternate transportation method. We respectfully ask you not to call the school to change your child dismissal procedures, as we need a note to make any dismissal changes. If you are changing your child from bus rider to car rider status for the day, we prefer a note. However, you may do this by phone, but we will **NOT** make any changes to dismissal procedures **after 3:00 pm and 12:00pm on early dismissal days.**

Additionally, to have a safe and orderly dismissal, we ask if you are picking up your student for an appointment on an early dismissal day, please pick up your student by 12:00 p.m. on the early dismissal days. Please keep in mind on early dismissal days students are considered absent for the entire day if they do not attend more than 2 hours of the ½ day. Additionally, on regular schedule days, if students are picked up early, they will be marked as "early dismissal" on these days. The Maryland Department of Education keeps track of student attendance including tardy and early dismissal. Please help us to ensure students are present for the entire school day.
