Happy New Year to all! We hope everyone had a restful Winter Break and time with family. We welcome everyone back for the 2^{nd} semester of school.

REMINDER: HCPS has been granted 3 asynchronous days for inclement weather. In preparation for HCPS to conduct this asynchronous virtual instruction, all students in grades K-5 will bring home their Chromebooks on Monday, January 9, 2023. Students will need to log into their inclement weather tile on Canvas and send a confirmation message to their teacher. Make sure you check the Home Access Center at least bi-weekly if your student is in grades 3-5. Their grades are updated bi-weekly and you can keep track of how they are doing as the quarter progresses. The last day for 2nd quarter grades is January 27, 2023. Also, all parents of students in grades K-5 need to access Home Access Center to see your child's report card. You need to create an account by going to <u>www.hcps.org</u> and clicking the Home Access Center icon. You do need your child's student ID number, which your child should know as it is their PIN number that they have from the time the enter school through high school.

January is full of learning! Watch for details in your weekly updates and reminders on ClassTag.

Here are the unit titles for each subject area.

Math: Understanding Subtraction Reading: Super Powers Phonics: Word-Part Power Writing: Writing for Readers T.U.B.: Wonders of Winter and Polar Animals

We have a few reminders for the winter weather.

1. Warm clothes: As it gets colder, please make sure your child has proper outerwear for recess, such as hats, gloves, coats, and boots as needed. Back up clothes may need to be updated to match the weather as well. (We go outside, even when it is cold, around 40°.)

2. Water bottles: It is very helpful for students to have a personal water bottle for the classroom.

6. Sneakers: Boots keep us warm, but sneakers let us climb the equipment! Students can pack their sneakers in their backpack for easy access for P.E. and recess. (We go outside, even when it is cold, around 40°.)




HELLO FAMILIES AND WELCOME TO SECOND GRADE!

We have been loving working with our sweet second grade students! The kids have been doing an amazing job—we are **SO PROUD**!

MATH: We have recently completed Topic 5 and are on topic 6. Please make sure your child is completing their nightly homework. Homework packets are sent home at the beginning of each unit. You may also help your child at home by practicing their addition and subtraction skills from 0-100. Students are also encouraged to complete activities on Dream Box, which can be found through the Canvas tile on their computer start pages. Reach out to your child's teacher if you have any questions.

READING: We are currently in our third unit titled Tackling Longer Words and Longer Books. Students have been using a variety of strategies to learn from text, growing knowledge across texts on a common topic, understanding basic text structures, and using that understanding to strategically read. Please make sure your child is reading at least 20 minutes each night and getting their log signed by a grownup.

WRITING: We have started our third unit—Writing about Reading. In this unit, students are writing opinion pieces. Students are working hard to develop their writing stamina!



PHONICS: Our second-grade students love phonics and their classroom's Gus! He has been a wonderful helper. We are currently in our third phonics unit, titled Word Builders, students will turn their attention to word endings in order to spell words. Students have also been reviewing and testing their ability to read and spell Snap Words to become Snap Word Celebrities! We cannot wait to see all the growth they make with words this year!

THIRD GRADE JANUARY 2022

READING AND WRITING UNITS OF STUDY

For writing, students are working on persuasive speeches that focus on an area in the school that they feel needs improvement. They are learning ways to support their opinions with strong evidence and reasoning.

Students should also continue working on their math fact fluency! First in Math is a great resource that they can assess at home.


Lastly, students should be spending time at home on Dreambox. This targets your student's specific needs.

REMINDER OF HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS




What's Happening in Fourth Grade?

In the new year we are looking forward to writing another essay, but this time focusing on books. Students are diving deep to understand characters motivations and changes to read and write intensely about their books. In math, we will be learning more division strategies and moving into understanding the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division) and when to use each operation in word problems and multi-step problems. Please continue having your student practice fact fluency throughout break! Flash cards, color by numbers, and real-life problem solving (estimating, helping with recipe amounts, or even comparing prices of items while shopping) are all fantastic ways to get your student thinking about math outside of school. In social studies, we will be moving from Colonial Region research, to causes of the Revolutionary War.

January - Fifth Grade Newsletter!

HAPPY NEW YEAR! We are nearing the end of the 2nd quarter; the final date is January 31st! Please make sure you are checking HAC and keeping up with your child's grades as we are moving through the 2nd half of the year. If you have any questions about grades, please contact your child's teacher.

In math, we are working on Unit 6: Use Models and Strategies to Divide Decimals which is where we cover using models and strategies to divide into decimals, we encourage students to complete any math homework that is sent home, it will help them understand concepts in the future!



In reading, that have a book bag that they will bring home each night. PLEASE make sure they bring it back and forth. They are encouraged to read at home each night for a half hour. Our reading unit is interpretation book clubs. When your students are at home they can read a book of their choice, it does not have to be their book club book unless they are behind.

In writing, we are focusing on Literary Essays. They will be learning how to analyze books and videos. As they progress the students will be writing 5 paragraph essays with a thesis statement.

January

Unit: Bowling, Throwing & Catching

Pre-K and Kindergarten: We will be using our newfound underhand throwing skills and transfer them to a modified game of bowling! We will also be getting more practice with our catching & throwing skills in other games like Freeze the Castle, Alligator Alley, Bucket Catch and MORE!

1st and 2nd Grades: We will also be using our underhand throwing practice to help with the skill of rolling and learn about the game of bowling and using some of our math skills to keep track of our score in a modified game of bowling. As well as continuing our practice throwing and catching. We will be working on other games like Alligator Alley, Bucket Catch and more as well!

3rd-5th Grades: Students will be working on a variety of skills including bowling, keeping proper score during a bowling game, catching while moving and throwing to a moving target. Some other games we will be playing include the Step Back Challenge, Alligator Alley, Bucket Catch, Ultimate Ball!

Reminder!! Please wear appropriate clothing for Physical Education, this includes closed toed and backed shoes, with no heels (sneakers). Shoes should also be able to be tightened (Laces or straps). Be sure to wear loose fitting clothing that is easy to move in as well.

Art



News from Mrs. Price's Art Classroom:

Pre-Kindergarten students just finished up decorating a gingerbread character. We will continue to work on developing their fine motor skills by making marks and experiencing various fun art materials. In January we will use a variety of materials to make a melted snowman.

Kindergarten students have been practicing using scissors. We will finish up our penguin collages.

First Grade students will refine their scissors use and create a winter polar bear mixed-media collage that includes a cut-paper snowflake.

Second Grade students will create a mixed-media winter snow globe.

Third Graders are finishing up painting their landscapes. Next, we will learn about complementary colors and use complementary color pairs in the creation of a hot cocoa inspired mixed-media collage.

Fourth Grade students are finishing up their point of view snowmen. Next, we will learn about the Japanese art of ink-painting and create our own Sumi-e inspired artwork.

Fifth Graders will create a mixed-media artwork inspired by Robert Frost's poem, "Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening." They will use the masking method to create birch trees. We will also utilize scientific vocabulary when talking about how watercolor paint reacts to salt.



News from Ms. Benedetto's Art Classroom:

Kindergarten will finish their penguin and snowman mixed media collages by using cutting and gluing skills.

First Grade students will finish their winter self-portraits and penguin collage projects.

Second Grade students will finish their mixed-media winter landscape and then create Mary Blair inspired castles using warm and cool colors.

Third Grade students will finish their complementary mixed-media hot cocoa mug and then learn about symmetry to create snowflakes and a Notan collage.

Fifth Graders will finish their mixed-media winter landscape and then use their knowledge of value to create festive lights or an optical illusion artwork.

What's Coming Next?

In general music, our Pre-K and K students will be using their singing voices, their rhythm skills, and movement to increase their understanding of musical opposites. These are fast/slow, high/low, loud/soft etc.

1st grade general music students will be using their knowledge of solfege syllables to sing and identify patterns of so, mi, and la on the staff.

Our 2nd grade students will be applying their singing and note names skills to identify melodic contour (direction, step notes, skip notes, and leap notes). They will also apply this understanding through learning how to play melodies on the bell sets (xylophones).

Our 3rd grade students will begin reviewing note names on the staff to begin their recorder unit. If you did not receive the recorder letter before winter break, please email your student's music teacher. Our 4th and 5th grade students will be finishing up their units on musical form. 4th grade will be applying their understanding by creating a theme and variation composition. Our 5th grade students will be composing a Rondo form composition.

Once this unit is completed for our 4th grade students, they will begin their unit on Boom whackers. These are pitched tubes that we will use to read and perform music as groups or whole class. Our 5th araders will then beain their unit on Ukuleles.

Math & Literature

Books are incredibly effective tools for teaching children new concepts, especially as it pertains to subjects like history and science. But, did you know the math and literature connection can be just as powerful?

Why Math and Literature?

There are many reasons math and literature pair so well together:

- Books introduce math concepts in a non-threatening way and build interest.
- Good stories make math come alive and children find that math is not boring or inaccessible.
- Mathematics within stories provides context that illuminates the meaning of otherwise abstract concepts. This is especially helpful for struggling learners.
- Oftentimes, literature connects math to real life. This gives meaning to "why" math is important.
- Some books offer sneaky ways to review math facts.
- Gifted mathematicians can benefit from literature connections, especially when books present concepts in new ways or dive deeper than the student has been before.
- Some books are excellent at presenting math as critical thinking. Introducing these logical thinking skills to young children can help them later in life.



RSV in Maryland: Health Site Urges Flu, COVID Vaccines

Across the state, officials are reporting rising case numbers of RSV, flu, COVID-19, and other respiratory illnesses. The symptoms of all these illnesses are very similar-some combination of runny/stuffy nose, sore throat, cough, headache, fever, fatigue, etc. The only way to be sure of what is causing your symptoms, is to be tested. At home testing can rule out COVID-19 but you will need to see a medical provider to determine if your symptoms are caused by RSV, flu, or strep.



****BUS LOOP REMINDER****

Cars are not allowed in the bus loop from 8:00-9:00 a.m. and 3:00-4:00 p.m. daily. Please adhere to the posted signs and guidelines and use the upper parking lot during these times.

Student Pick-Up and/or Changes in Dismissal

Parents are asked to write a note to your child's teacher if your child's dismissal procedure is going to change on any day. Teachers are instructed to send all students home using their normally dismissal mode, unless there is a note identifying an alternate transportation method. We respectfully ask you not to call the school to change your child dismissal procedures, as we need a note to make any dismissal changes. If you are changing your child from bus rider to car rider status for the day, we prefer a note. However, you may do this by phone, but we will **NOT** make any changes to dismissal procedures **after 3:00 pm and 12:00pm on early dismissal days.**

Additionally, to have a safe and orderly dismissal, we ask if you are picking up your student for an appointment on an early dismissal day, please pick up your student prior to 12:00 p.m. on the early dismissal days. Please keep in mind on early dismissal days students are considered absent for the entire day if they do not attend more than 2 hours of the ½ day. Additionally, on regular schedule days, if students are picked up early, they will be marked as "early dismissal" on these days. The Maryland Department of Education keeps track of student attendance including tardy and early dismissal. Please help us to ensure students are present for the entire school day.
